I saw your mother/grandmother's obituary in the Deseret News and after reading it, I wanted to tell you of my family's connection with yours. Ann sounded like a wonderful person. Like her, I am the youngest in my family and was born and raised in Boone, Iowa where your grandfather Carl served a mission for a while. He was there when my brother (18 years my senior) was born in 1919. Because my father was not a member of the Church, Elder Reimann gave him his baby blessing. My mother (Sue Stroble) named the baby Reimann Leon Stroble. Although that was somewhat of a strange first name, he was always very proud of it and refused to have a nickname. I grew up with stories of the young missionaries from Utah and how they made a difference in an area of the country that had few LDS members. I even have some old photos that were labeled "Elder Reimann and companion." My brother told me that Carl sent him a birthday card with a dollar bill in it for several years while he was young, but I think they lost track of each other eventually. I thought you would like to know how MY Reimann turned out. He served in the Army in WW2, graduated from Iowa State College in Ames, Iowa and was an engineer for General Electric Corp. his entire life, mostly in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.
