I hope Kendall's family will see my heartfelt tribute to Kendall. My name's Larry and I'm an alcoholic. In August 1992, when I started attending meetings in a desperate attempt to get one day of sobriety, I sat right in back of Kendall at the Wednesday night Foothill meeting. Almost 29 years later, I can still quote what he shared. I have told the story many times--including several when Kendall was in the room--and I have always said that these were the magic words--the final piece of the puzzle I needed to get that precious one day. He said: "Alcoholism is not about how much we drank, or when we drank, or why we drank." And that really caught my attention, because that was exactly the debate I had spent my entire adult life winning. He said, no. "Alcoholism is about the negative impact of our drinking on our judgment, our emotions and our relationships." Every light in my brain went on. I thought, I have spent decades doing the best I could do to cope with the negative impact of my drinking on: my judgment, my emotions and my relationships. My next thought was: there is not a shred of evidence to make me believe I can do better with that in the future than I have in the past. And so my choice suddenly became very clear and straightforward: I can either keep doing what I've been doing until it destroys me; or I can stay in A.A. and learn how to stay sober one day at a time. That was when I got my first day of sobriety--and remains my one and only sobriety date. August 8, 1992. A direct result of what I heard Kendall share. When I was almost exactly six months sober, some terrible thing happened in the painful breakup I was going through, and I made the decision to drink that night. But I had enough program in me that I decided to go to a meeting first. Give it that last chance. I didn't even go into that big gym in the church on Murray-Holiday Blvd. I stood in the back doorway, leaning in to hear sometimes, leaning out on my way out the door sometimes. The chairman called on Kendall. I thought, I like listening to Kendall, I'll stay until he's finished. And I listened. He said: "The first year of any alcoholic's sobriety has to be the most challenging year of his life." And every light in my brain turned on again. I thought, I am halfway through the most challenging year of my life, and if I go out, I either have to stay out--or start the most challenging year of my life all over again. Those words that Kendall spoke that night were my last--and only--line of defense that night. But they were powerful enough to keep me sober that night. Your line: "Kendall...inspired thousands of people to live a life free from addiction." I know the truth of that in the deepest personal way, because I speak as one of them. Kendall saved my life--twice. And I want to believe that he would be amused to know that I am still telling those stories to anyone who'll listen. Thank you, Kendall. I will always remember what you did for me. God bless you.
