John was known as a very hard worker and always provided well for his family. John was a highly skilled jet engine mechanic and retired as a driver for UPS. He was active in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and held many leadership positions in his local congregations over the years.

In John's later years, although his Parkinson's Disease impacted his life significantly, he never lost his sense of humor and was always cracking a joke and making his family members laugh. He also never lost his love for cars and almost pulled off a car purchase out the back door of his Assisted Living facility, while in quarantine for Coronavirus!

He will be missed dearly and remembered as the wonderful husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather that he was.
