He always wanted to drive; to see how fast he could go and he usually found it. After finishing school at West Jordan High, Jake spent some quality time living in Texas with his mom and sister. He loved hanging out with his little sister, Whitney, where he provided solid direction, mentorship and inspiration to her. During this period, they learned a lot about life together, some good, some bad but mostly they learned to laugh together, they laughed at everything. After spending a little time in Texas, Jake decided to follow his brother's and grandfather's footsteps and joined the armed services. He enlisted in the United States Air Force in 2005, completed boot camp and became a member of the 130th Engineering and Installation Squadron. It was here that he developed a large interest in networks, fiber optics and trouble-shooting systems. In a very short amount of time, Jake became very good in this line of work.
