Our beloved Wife, Mother, Grandmother, friend, and "angel" Aileen Tatsue Shiratori Ikeda passed away at home on December 9th 2018, after a long battle with cancer. Aileen was born on the island of Maui, Hawaii on April 5th, 1940. After high school she moved to Salt Lake City, where she attended and graduated from LDS Business College. It was during this time she became a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.
