Allen Lynn Carter was born on November 27, 1926 to Archie Eugene and Annie Sims Jones Carter. Born and raised in Salt Lake City, in reality, he grew up on the family's 1000 acre Mountain Meadows Ranch at Kimball's Junction near Park City. He graduated from East High School and attended the University of Utah. He served in the US Army at the end of World War II and was stationed as part of the occupation forces in Japan. Upon his return, on a visit to the Utah State Capitol, he met a young and beautiful employee, Beverlee Andersen, whom he married on June 12, 1951, later solemnized in the Salt Lake Temple. Allen was many things to many people: businessman, outdoorsman, hunter, camper, boater and skier. For decades he ran the family business started by his father: AE Carter Distributing, Eureka Appliance Company, Carter Brothers LLC, Durfee Creek Estates and others. Never would a year go by without visits to Lake Powell, Flaming Gorge, Bear Lake, Rockport Lake, the Wasatch and Uinta Mountains, Alta, Brighton or Park City. He made the family home at the base of beautiful Mt. Olympus. But more than ever, Allen was a family man dedicated to his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. A lifetime member of the LDS Church and the Holladay 7th, Mt. Olympus 2nd and Olympus Cove wards.
