She returned to Salt Lake City in 2003 to start her professional career working in the Emergency Department at Saint Marks Hospital in Millcreek, Utah, where she worked for 19 years until her cancer diagnosis in 2022. Amie was an active member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. She held numerous church positions many of which involved working with the young women. She went to great efforts to make each of them feel special and loved. She was a great example of someone who loved our Savior and was never hesitant to share her testimony of Him. She followed His example by loving and serving those around her that were in need.

Amie had the ability to make friends easily and developed many life-long friendships. She enjoyed doing fun activities such as boating, water and snow skiing, and running marathons. She also loved being pampered and experiencing the finer things of life.

She put her heart and soul into everything she did for them including making holidays and birthdays spectacular. Amie loved watching her children play sports.
