



## Bonnie Jean West Olsen

*February 27, 1930 ~ December 6, 2022*

Bonnie Jean West Olsen, 92, passed away peacefully at home on the morning of Tuesday, December 6, 2022. Bonnie was born February 27, 1930, in Morgan, Utah to Rulon Rufus West and Flora Eddington. She lived her early childhood in Rock Springs, Wyoming and Morgan, Utah where her father operated several successful businesses. When she was 10, her family moved to Salt Lake City where she graduated from East High School and attended the University of Utah where she was a member of Alpha Delta Pi.

She met her husband, Lynn when she was 16 years old while on a summer's night drive to Liberty Park with her cousins. They dated for four years and were married in the Salt Lake LDS Temple on May 12, 1950. They began their life together in a quaint home in Granger. In 1956; as their family began to expand, they moved to Holladay and eventually built their forever home in the middle of a pear orchard located in the beautiful community of Granite in 1970.

In 1972, Bonnie and Lynn purchased Dimple Dell Floral where many hours were spent planting, nurturing the growth of and selling beautiful plants and flower arrangements to wholesale and retail customers while simultaneously instilling the values of work and self-reliance in their children. Bonnie was a talented designer who provided beautiful arrangements and bouquets for weddings, funerals and high school dances. For many years, she provided flower arrangements for semiannual worldwide broadcasts of General Conference of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

Bonnie freely offered her time and talents to her church family where she served in various capacities. She also enjoyed the many years she spent serving as a volunteer at Cottonwood Hospital and Intermountain Medical Center. Her greatest joy however, came from serving her family. She loved to host large family gatherings (especially during the holidays), traveling with extended family and anything that would bring her family together. But what she loved the most was welcoming and showering love on her grand and great-grandchildren who loved her right back. Being a grandmother was her true calling. She was a renowned baby whisperer, a gracious hostess who never let anyone leave her home hungry and her grandchildren's greatest cheerleader. She was passionate about being involved in their education, so much so that she would volunteer in their classrooms teaching them and their classmates how to read. On many occasions, what originally started out as an evening visit to her home quickly turned into a "sleepover" or an overnight "camp" in her motorhome. Experiences like these created strong bonds between cousins who remain close to this day.
