



## Bruce William Miller

*March 23, 1949 ~ April 22, 2025*

Bruce William Miller passed away peacefully at his home in Sandy, Utah, on April 22, 2025, ushered with the love of his family into the arms of his Heavenly Father after a courageous 22-year battle with cancer.

Bruce was born on March 23, 1949, in American Fork, Utah, to Billy L. Miller and Ilah Chloe (Bennett) Miller. He was the oldest of six children and a devoted member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

Bruce graduated with the first senior class of Kearns High School in 1967, where he lettered in track and field and earned the lifelong nickname "Flash." After high school, Bruce joined the United States Navy on August 30, 1969, completing his training in San Diego, California, and serving as a radioman at Schofield Barracks in Hawaii. It was there he met the love of his life, Natalie "Jeanie" Enriques. They were married on November 2, 1973, in Kaneohe, Hawaii.

Following their marriage, Bruce and Jeanie made their home in Salt Lake City, Utah. Bruce worked at Hercules while earning his associate degree from Utah Technical College. He went on to serve as the Data Processing Manager for Sandy City from 1976 to 1996. After earning his MBA from the University of Phoenix, he continued his career as an Information Technology Manager for Salt Lake County until his retirement.

Throughout his 76 years, Bruce cultivated an extraordinary circle of friends and family, thanks to his innate kindness, his ability to get along with everyone, and his unforgettable sense of humor. He loved skiing, fishing, motorcycle rides, golfing, attending family events, and gathering with his lifelong friends from the Kearns High School Usher's Club, Sandy City Retiree group, and the Cotton Bottom group.

The love Bruce gave will continue to be felt by his wife of 52 years, Jeanie; his daughter, Chelsea (Wendy) Blanchard; his grandchildren, William (Sam) Morley, Adairah Morley, and Tessalin (Zachary Priano) Morley; his brothers, Danny Miller and Billy W.
