Felipe (Phil) Marquez born February 20, 1951 in Chicago, IL, passed away peacefully in SLC at age 69 on February 6, 2021, after a courageous battle with complications associated with Type 1 Diabetes. Son of Candido M. Marquez and Rosa Talamontez Marquez, Phil's family moved to Santa Fe, NM when he was 6 and he later attended NM State University before relocating to SLC, UT. He worked at the Department of Transportation and the State of Utah. He then worked as a drafter/designer at Northwest Pipeline Corporation (which later became The Williams Company), where he met Linda Beth Krause whom he married in 1980. Their family became complete when they adopted daughter, Amy Leigh Marquez, in 1986.

One of Phil's favorite hobbies was testing his marksmanship at the shooting range and later skeet shooting. He was also an avid photographer, and lover of fine arts.
