Gary Freeman Gabrielsen, age 94, passed away on Friday July 25, 2025, in Draper, Utah. She was the first of 9 children born to Ed and Beth Freeman in Idaho Falls, ID on Jan 21, 1931. Gary enjoyed a happy childhood growing up in Eastern Idaho during the Great Depression.

She was an extraordinary teacher both in the classroom and at church, known for her ability to connect with teenagers and share valuable life skills.

Gary was preceded in death by her husband, Ron, one grandchild, and six of her siblings. She is survived by her children: R Joseph Gabrielsen, Jr. (Laurie), Randee Gabrielsen, David Gabrielsen (Loriann), Diane Fager (Vance), and Todd Gabrielsen (Liz), and 22 grandchildren.
