Jeanette was famous for her goodies, treats, and meals. She was passionate about cooking and sharing her food with neighbors, family, and friends. The freezer would often be stocked with Scottish Shortbread Cookies, Hello Dolly Bars, or her coveted Pecan Logs. She constantly battled her husband and children, who would be looting the freezer for these goodies. She had to get creative in hiding these treats so she would have time to bag and deliver them to her intended recipients.

Jeanette also enjoyed socializing and sharing stories. One of her most spectacular stories involved her surviving a plane crash. It was a small aircraft that crashed into a mountainside in Utah. Thankfully, everyone survived, including Jeanette. She was filled with stories, and people loved listening to her and being around her animated, playful personality. She loved socializing at events so much that her immediate family almost had to drag her away to get her to leave. Fortunately, it never came to that.

Jeanette loved the holidays and the family traditions that surrounded them. From her Christmas stuffed bear advent calendar to her Thanksgiving gumdrop turkeys, she drove family traditions that are certain to live in memories and

be passed on to generations. Her bright personality made every holiday activity fun in an extraordinary way. Jeanette could be summed up in one word: selfless. Everything she did was for her family, friends, and community—packing lunches, teaching/coaching, baking goodies, serving her community, serving in her church callings, visiting neighbors, and scouting. She left a beautiful mark on this world and will be dearly missed by all who loved her. Not an insignificant number.
