Her favorite food was spaghetti and her favorite dessert was vanilla ice cream with caramel topping. She loved to sneak a soda or chocolate. Her favorite television shows were Bonanza with her friends the Cartwrights, Little House on the Prairie and Lawrence Welk where she sang along out of tune with gusto or danced gracefully to the music. She liked to go to the University of Utah gymnastics meets and the JAZZ was her favorite team. She had an amazing sense of time, direction and memory, especially of people and names.

Val had many health issues but lived a long life, thanks to many good doctors, a fantastic Hospice team and the loving care of her family members. After the death of her mother, she lived in the home of her sister, Diane, for 14 years. Val was preceded in death by her parents and brother, Jay.
