



## Marinus Cornelis Boogert

*Oct. 16, 1928 ~ Jan. 4, 2022*

Marinus Cornelis Boogert passed away on Tuesday, January 4, 2022, just 23 days after his sweetheart, Virginia. He was born Marinus Cornelis Dingeman van den Boogert, October 16, 1928, in Amsterdam, Netherlands to Marinus Cornelis van den Boogert and Adriaantje (Jane) van Deijl. He was the oldest of their two sons. When 11 years old, the Nazis occupied Holland. As a teenager during World War II, he found work apprenticing for a pastry baker.

After the war he served in the Dutch Army. During this time his family was approved and received confirmation to immigrate to the United States of America, coming to Utah in November 1948. He was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1951, proudly serving along with his brother John as military police.

His family bought a house on the corner of 7th Avenue and C Street in Salt Lake City, Utah. Next door lived a beautiful, American girl. Marinus and Virginia developed a dancing friendship and romance, being married and sealed in the Salt Lake Temple on July 20, 1951. Together they created a wonderful life of over 70 years while raising Jann, Kent, and Kevin; their oldest son, Kim, died in childbirth.

Marinus was a painting contractor and owned Boogert Painting and Decorating, Inc. and provided a great life for his family. He was a skilled craftsman and had a talent for color matching. Given a color sample, he could match the color perfectly. He was very talented in all aspects of construction. He could mend, fix, repair, and build anything.

He was an active member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints throughout his life, serving in multiple ward and stake callings. For over 20 years he served as the Scoutmaster of Troop 423. Many boys spent a week at summer camp in the Uintas, Flaming Gorge, and other locations being taught life lessons while earning their Eagle Scout awards. In recognition of his many years of service he was honored to receive the Silver Beaver Award in 2016. A cherished calling was serving with his sweetheart as ordinance workers in the Salt Lake Temple for over 12 years. His testimony of the Savior, prayer, priesthood, and temple work were unwavering.

He was proud of his American citizenship and considered himself an American, yet instilled the Dutch culture, food, traditions, and a love of his Dutch heritage in his children, grandchildren, and even his great-grandchildren.

Marinus was proud of his posterity. He often didn't have much to say, but always taught by example. He loved to laugh and joke; loved a good prank; enjoyed an ice cold Coke; was always optimistic; enjoyed life and lived it with a smile. His direct advice, words of encouragement and simple unique reprimands will be missed. He instilled the values of work, education, respect, honesty, kindness, integrity, love, and trust. We love you, Dad. See you on the other side. Wij houden van u.

He is preceded in death by his wife, Virginia, their infant son, Kim Cutler Boogert, and his brother John Harry (Lucy) Boogert.
