She grew up in Millcreek in a neighborhood full of friends who did all the usual things kids did in the 1960s and 70s, like play hopscotch and kick the can, ride bikes, have hula-hoop contests, flash peace signs to passing cars, and enjoy the long summer days. Mary attended Sherman Elementary School, Rosecrest Elementary where she received The Hope of America Award, Evergreen Junior High and graduated from Olympus High School class of 1981.

As a teenager, Mary lived for a time in Kearny, Arizona while her father's company transferred him to manage a mining operation there. She is so proud of them and worked hard to give them every opportunity. They were loved deeply by her in this life and will continue to be watched over by her from this day on.
