She attended Wasatch Academy during her high school years, where she received an excellent education and made many friends. She met Wallis Donovan when he was stationed with the Army at the Ogden Depot, Utah in the early 1940's. They were married on May 1, 1944 and he whisked her off to a new life on Long Island, New York, which was his home. They raised three daughters there, Mary Alta, Dee Anne and Stephanie.
