DORIS BUTTERS MCPHIE, 87, of Salt Lake City, Utah passed away at Scott and Kristie's home in Bozeman Montana, on February 6, 2018.

Dodie was born April 7, 1930 in Salt Lake City Utah, the second of three daughters born to Tim O. and Gladys Smith Butters. She married a good looking "older man" and love of her life, Cal McPhie on October 20, 1950. They lived to celebrate 64 years of marriage. Dodie was a graduate of East High and the University of Utah where she received her BS of Nursing. As a teen, Dodie had her first lung surgery. She worked her entire career at LDS Hospital starting in the nursery, then Labor and delivery, the thoracic intensive care unit and eventually medical records. Childhood summers were spent at her parent's ranch in the Uintah Basin where she loved helping with the sheep and riding horses. Winters in Salt Lake were wondrous for a girl who loved school and a big supportive family centered around her grandmother's home on Virginia Street.

Always active, Dodie loved biking, running, skiing, hiking into the mountains and golfing with the Bonneville ladies league. She grew up catching trout with a willow fishing "pole" and recalled catching large spawners near Yellowstone Park with her bare hands, which Cal teased her about forever!

She and Cal owned Little Mountain Ski area up Emigration Canyon starting in 1951 where so many kids learned to ski!! They were very active with Intermountain Ski Association and Utah Ski Archives.

Dodie enjoyed quilting with family, knitting and loved doing needlepoint with her "needlepoint ladies". She was a patron of the arts enjoying the ballet as well as live theatre and anything Ute sports related.

She loved to exercise and worked all her life to be healthy. She had an amazing smile and impeccable fashion sense. She taught her children the value of family and how important they are in our lives. As a mother she was a great listener but didn't hesitate to say what she thought! As a nurse she was often sought out for help or assistance. She was spot on with what was wrong and how to fix it or make it feel better. The kids could NEVER feign sickness as she saw right through it.

Dodie was preceded in death by her parents Gladys and Tim Butters, her beloved husband Cal, sister Annette B. Hadley, 2 infant sons David, Mark and son Matt.
