Peggy was born to amazing parents, Fred and Jeanne Allredge, on May 12, 1948. We are so happy she is able to use her unforgettable laugh with her dad again and fully believe if you listen hard enough, you will hear it. Fred was full of all the best nonsense and Jeanne taught Peggy everything she needed to know to be the incredible wife and mother she became. Peggy loved her brothers and sisters. Bonnie, Fred Jr., Kim, Kay and Suzanne. Peggy felt a lot of responsibility to help her mother who was in poor health during Peggy's childhood. Peggy looked over her older sister Bonnie, who was born with Down's syndrome and took her role seriously. Peggy loves her brothers and sisters and has always been proud of her family.

Peggy was a lifetime learner. She attended Dixie College in St. George where she made lifelong friends. She then attended the Church College of Hawaii with the goal to finally get over her fear of water. Swimming lessons did not pan out and Peggy left Hawaii with her hatred of water and sand firmly intact. She then headed to Weber State University where she met and married her eternal love, Ken Dyer. Peggy graduated with a degree in Family Life from BYU in 2009 at the age of 61.

Ken and Peggy were married on the snowy December 16, 1970. They were sealed in the Salt Lake Temple on April 3, 1972. Their marriage is one built on unselfish love, service, hard work, respect and fidelity. Ken and Peggy's great gift will be the legacy of love they perfectly exemplified. Ken served Peggy every minute of every day during her battle with cancer. Their devotion to each other is an envy to all who have the blessing of witnessing it.

Peggy is survived by her husband Ken, her seven children Brandon (Kami), Tiffany Gordon (Scott), Travis (Jen), Brett (Kendra), Brittany Anderson (Jeremy), Marc (Emily) and Aaron (Alex), her 32 grandchildren, and 11 great-grandchildren with 3 on the way, her sibling's Fred, Kim, Kay (Debbie), and Suzanne and sibling's in-law Bonnie Goldsberry, Pam Rodgers (Ron), Terri Serrine (Todd). She is preceded in death by her parents, Fred and Jeanne Alldredge, and sister Bonnie and in-laws Joseph and Mable Dyer.
