Rosalyn was welcomed back into the loving arms of her caring husband, daughter, mother and father and other loved ones on Friday, March 25, 2022. She was born to Eldon and Gladys Barnes on May 7, 1927, in Lehi, Utah. She didn't know it at the time, but her long-term childhood friendship with Barbara Mumford would lead to her meeting her future husband, Ferris, although she considered him one of those "awful" brothers of Barbara who teased her growing up.

Rosalyn married Ferris on August 2, 1946 in the Salt Lake Temple following his return from World War II. They settled in Sandy where they raised two daughters, Michele and Teresa, and were happily married for over 62 years. During the time they shared together, they loved exploring southern Utah's red rock country, frequently visited their cabin near Fruitland, and filled both of their homes with Ferris's handcrafted wood creations. Many of which have been passed down to family members and are still enjoyed to this day.
